MINUTES

STUDENT COUNCIL REPORTS

Kay Casturo from Jefferson Middle School presented a report on the activities at Jefferson Middle School. The fundraising for the Alzheimer's Association has continued with a spirit night at Chick-fil-A adding \$145.12 to the donation. This brings the total to \$489.31 for the school year. As Jefferson MS students clean out their lockers, they will be asked to donate new and gently used school supplies to help supply underprivileged schools in South Dakota, Kenya and Malawi. A Wish Week was held with council members donning wings, spreading cheer and granting wishes. Finally, JMS seventh grader Rebecca Schwartz won a middle level board seat for the 2014-2015 PASC District Board.

Mellon Middle School Student Council member Anna Conway reported on the activities at Mellon. During the PSSA testing, student council braved the cold and decorated the entrances to Mellon with encouraging words for the students and staff. During the month of May, students gave tours to 5th grade elementary students around Mellon in preparation for the coming school year. The Student Council is finishing the year with a drive to help school students in Malawi. Mellon students will be asked to donate school supplies from their lockers as they clean them out at the end of the year.

Julie Niederberger, High School Student Body Co-Treasurer, presented the final report of the year on the activities at the High School. New Student Body Officers will be inducted for the 2014-2015 school year. New officers are Nikola Ranick and Joey Stabile as Co-Presidents, Ryan Caste and Evan Cohen as Co-Vice Presidents, Kevin Caste and Lyvia Hurst as Co-Secretaries and Reed Callan and Joel Kirshner as Co-Treasurers.

The high school production of Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Carousel" was a huge success. The cast, the crew, and the orchestra pulled off an amazing performance each and every night in the Fine Arts Theatre.

The Sophomore Class has produced a public service announcement regarding the need for all students to clean up their trash in each of the school's cafeteria. It is a humorous and effective way to encourage our student body to be more responsible for their litter. They are also planning a Class of 2016 Field Day at Bird Park on June 9th, after final exams. They are planning to have a variety of fun outdoor games and a bonfire to commemorate the end of their sophomore year in high school.

All of the seniors are looking forward to several events that will recognize the end of our high school career. The Senior Reception will occur this Wednesday, May 22nd, and "Puttin' on the Glitz" is the theme for this year's Prom which will take place at the Omni William Penn Hotel on May 27th. Then on June 10th, the Senior Class Picnic in the Park will be held prior to the Commencement rehearsal. And finally, on Wednesday, June 11th, Commencement will take place.

BOARD PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Mrs. Cappucci took a moment to talk of all the work the Board does, where all of the decisions lead us, the bigger picture of what is going on in the District, and how the decisions made reflect in the day to day work of the staff and in outcomes for children.

The Board has been discussing the 2014-2015 budget since January, and the administration has been working on it all year. Board members have done their due diligence and have met individually with the District administration and reviewed volumes of financial information. the Board has taken all of the information received into consideration in the development of this budget and will be taking action this evening on the final budget in the amount of \$87,924,509, requiring a millage increase of 0.54 mills, or a total rate of 23.15 mills.

Mrs. Cappucci reported that a ruling on the grievance which the MLEA filed against the District in late 2011 has been clarified by the arbitrator. The award applies only to teachers hired after the fall of 2011 (and prior to 2013, when the District began giving credits for permanent substitute time in the District) so the cost to the District moving only those teachers up on the salary scale will be approximately \$20,000. The Board is relieved to have this issue settled as we prepare to take action on the budget for next year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Dr. Steinhauer highlighted the work and careers of some of the finest administrators, teachers and staff on the occasion of their retirement from the Mt. Lebanon School District. This year there are three administrators, four teachers and five support staff totaling over 243 of expertise and experience in the Mt. Lebanon School District. Certificates of Appreciation and a Mt. Lebanon pin were presented to Dr. Deb Allen, Connie Lewis, Mary Ann Schnirel, Gary Ford, Mary Luxbacher, Marilyn Reinhard, Cynthia Schreiner, Elizabeth Baer, Anthony Biagini, Maureen

Bushman, Marilyn Hesemann, and Myrona Little. Dr. Steinhauer thanked each of them for their dedication to Mt. Lebanon students and their service to the District.

The Mt. Lebanon School District and Director of Business, Ms. Janice Klein, received the Association of School Business Officials International's Certificate of Excellence in Financing Reporting award for having exceeded the program's high standards for financial reporting and accountability. The District was recognized for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the fiscal year ending 2013. This is the 29th year the District has been honored with the prestigious award.

Dr. Steinhauer reported that this spring, our students excelled in academic Competitions at the state and national level. The Model UN ended its season by winning the conference at Westminster College completing a perfect season winning all five tournaments this year. Congratulations to the students and their faculty advisors, Peter DiNardo, George Savarese, and Adam Lumish on an outstanding season.

Nineteen students from grades 5-12 competed in Knoxville, TN at the Academic Games National Tournament. Players participated in cube and trivia games against hundreds of other players in the areas of mathematics, set theory, presidents, propaganda techniques, language, current events, and American History. The following Mt. Lebanon students excelled in the competition and won several awards including Leo Matros, a sixth grader from Jefferson Middle School and senior Tom Jasionowski. Congratulations to all of the students who participated and their coaches, high school staff members Amanda Checque, Mike Yazvac, Ben Minett, Brad Kavo, Mike Locke, and Mt. Lebanon graduate Nina Wroniak.

Mt. Lebanon students had an outstanding Odyssey of the Mind season this year with strong performances at the regional and state levels. At the regional competition in March, 28 teams from Mt. Lebanon participated and nine teams advanced to the State Finals. The High School team of Lydia Herman, Eva Morrison, Olivia Pandolfi, Ellie DePastino, Katie Lindefjeld, and Katie Brown were honored with the most prestigious award in Odyssey of the Mind, the Ranatra Fusca Creativity Award. Mt. Lebanon had the most teams of any school district represented at the state competition in April. Teams from Foster, Jefferson Middle, Mellon Middle, Markham, Jefferson Elementary and the High School participated. The High School team won first place in the state finals and were invited to attend the World competition at Iowa State University.

The superintendent reported that Caleb Reynolds was awarded the UPMC Sports Medicine "Comeback Player of the Month" by former Pittsburgh Steeler Hines Ward, Roberto Clemente, Jr., and Nathan Burt from UPMC. Caleb, a lacrosse player, was presented with the award which included a \$1,000 college scholarship from UPMC Sports Medicine.

This week the Mt. Lebanon Percussion will celebrate its 30th Anniversary. There will be a special alumni band performance, and internationally know compose and marimba soloist, Dr. Nathan Daughtrey, was commissioned to write a major work for the percussion ensemble. Congratulations to percussion director, Richard Minnotte, on this milestone celebration.

BOARD REPORTS

<u>Parkway West Career and Technical Center</u> –Mr. Remely reported that the culinary school kitchens are under construction for the new school year. Ninety-four seniors passed with advanced rating in NOCTI exams. In the Skills USA completion, a student from Parkway advanced to the national level. Mt. Lebanon High School student, Malachi Owens, was named to the Parkway West CTC honor roll.

<u>SHASDA</u> – Mr. Riemer reported that the annual SHASDA conference was held April 25-26 at Southpointe. Nathan Mains, PSBA Executive Director, was the keynote speaker for the Friday evening dinner. Saturday morning's agenda included awards presented to two students from the participating districts who have overcome substantial obstacles. Mt. Lebanon awardees were Daniel Yessler and Abby Lane. The keynote speaker for the breakfast was Father Scott Seethaler.

<u>PSBA/NSBA</u> – Mrs. Birks reported that PSBA is now inviting all member school boards to submit comment and suggestions for the association's Legislative Platform for 2015, now until June 30. The Platform Committee has approved an initial draft of a new format for the 2015 platform to make it a more relevant tool for the association's advocacy efforts.

According to a May 13th Pittsburgh Tribune-Review article, two companion bills aiming to reallocate special education funding in Pennsylvania are under fire because of how they would distribute those funds to charter schools. Charter school advocates argue that the bills would decrease funding for their special education students and hinder their ability to provide adequate student care. But supporters of the legislation maintain that charters are dramatically overfunded now compared to traditional public schools.

Representative Dan Miller and Senator Matt Smith have kept the District informed of any and all education legislation. Mrs. Birks thanked both of these gentlemen for their diligence and service to our community and its constituents.

The U.S. House of Representatives passed H.R. 10, the "Success and Opportunity through Quality Charter Schools Act," on Friday, May 9. The legislation would support state efforts to start, expand, and replicate successful charter schools. The bill would also provide support for charter school facilities. Representative Tim Murphy voted "yea" to this legislation. While NSBA supports charter schools that are authorized by the local school boards in the communities where they are located, they voiced opposition to this legislation because it would not address the concerns expressed by the NSBA Delegate Assembly. These concerns included accountability and transparency, the bill's proposed authorization of funding, and proposed assistance for charter school facilities.

<u>MLFE/Capital Campaign</u> – Mr. Lebowitz reported that the MLFE has become much more active over the past several months partly due to Alyssa DeLuca taking charge of the organization. The Board has been actively working on by-laws, a mission statement and marketing and communications.

A case statement entitled "Century of Excellence" has been prepared with the help of Alyssa DeLuca and will become part of the marketing for the Capital Campaign. Pursuant Ketchum presented an interim report to the Cabinet Committee stating that the campaign is on track and proceeding as planned.

<u>Municipal Liaison</u> – Mr. Riemer reported that the Drug and Alcohol Task Force met to discuss future operations. Mr. Riemer and Commissioner Fraasch will speak about the task force and what has been done at a ministerial meeting headed by Father Bonner from St. Bernard. The Task Force is looking to address issues with the young adults in the community.

Mr. Riemer and Commissioner Fraasch held a joint meeting with Senator Smith and Representative Miller to discuss problems about tax assessments in Allegheny County and statewide, the state budget with no significant relief to school district in the future, PSERS, money spent by school districts on cyber and charter schools, and the PlanCon process.
